8:15 am BERMUDAGRASS, ZOYSIAGRASS, AND CENTIPEDEGRASS BREEDING - Brian Schwartz, UGA - An update will be given on the growing market and demand for TifGrand in addition to the shifting emphasis to screen for drought tolerance in our "Next Generation" bermudagrass. Also, the progress made during 2010 to make crosses and grow-out new zoysiagrasses from the Bladerunner UGA germplasm collection will be highlighted, followed by a brief report of the improvements made for shade, high pH, salinity, and cold tolerance in the centipedegrass breeding program.

8:30 am RESPONSE OF SPRING DEAD SPOT PATHOGENS TO FERTILIZATION PROGRAMS AND PREVENTIVE FUNGICIDES - Lane Tredway, NC State - Spring Dead Spot is the most severe disease of bermudagrass turf in the transition zone of the United States. The effective use of fungicides for prevention of Spring Dead Spot will be reviewed in detail. In addition, recent research has shown that fertilization programs have a major influence on Spring Dead Spot development, including that different Spring Dead Spot pathogens are suppressed by different nitrogen sources. The results of this research and implications to Spring Dead Spot management in the southeast will be discussed.

NEW HERBICIDE TECHNOLOGIES FOR TURF-GRASSES IN THE SOUTHERN U.S. - Fred Yelverton, NC State - Learn effective weed management for golf course, commercial and residential lawn care. This presentation will cover the latest research-based information and recommendations on current and forthcoming herbicides, as well as cultural management practices for effective weed management. Information on the fate and behavior of herbicides in a turfgrass environment will also be presented.

9:30 am MOBILE TURFGRASS APPLICATIONS - Patrick McCullough, UGA - Turfgrass faculty at the University of Georgia are currently working on creating mobile applications for practitioners to access from smart phones to enhance potential for education and extension. "Turfgrass Management"

was the first application released in 2009 and contains pictures, information, and recommendations for managing diseases, insects, weeds, and turfgrasses. "Turf Management Calculator" is a new comprehensive application that allows endusers to enter known values of equations and receive instantaneous answers. The applications will help our turfgrass managers calibrate, irrigate, topdress and calculate rates and prices of fertilizers and pesticides.

10:30 am **GENOTYPING IN TURFGRASS - Karen Harris Shultz, USDA** - This talk will focus on research on the 'Tifgreen'-derived mutation problem, the markers generated to distinguish some of these cultivars from each other, and how DNA finger-printing and ploidy analysis is performed on samples you send to the USDA in Tifton.

10:45 am DROUGHT TOLERANCE VS. DROUGHT RESISTANCE: UNDERSTANDING HOW TURF IS AFFECTED BY DROUGHT - Bryan Unruh, UF-Water use restrictions, prolonged drought, and limited turfgrass areas or bans on specific turfgrass species are resulting in many challenges in the Green Industry. This seminar will highlight how the different turfgrasses compare in their drought response.

11:15 am PRECISION TURF MANAGEMENT - A GLIMPSE INTO THE FUTURE - Chris Hartwiger, USGA - Over the next generation, the concepts of Precision Turf Management will impact how inputs such as fertilizer, water, and pesticides are applied to golf courses. This presentation will demonstrate how numerous technologies have come together in a way to have a positive impact on golf courses.

11:45 am A NEW AND IMPROVED SEASHORE PASPALUM CULTIVAR - Paul Raymer, UGA - Seashore paspalum is rapidly gaining popularity worldwide as warm-season perennial turfgrass that is especially well-adapted to moist tropical climates and salt-affected areas common in coastal regions. The turfgrass breeding program at the UGA Griffin Campus recently released a new seashore paspalum cultivar suited for golf courses, athletic fields, and other fine turf uses. This new vegetatively propagated cultivar has been extensively evaluated and gets higher marks than existing commercial cultivars for turf quality, color, cool season color, and disease resistance.


1:15 pm AN UPDATE FROM DOWN SOUTH: A REVIEW OF FLORIDA GOLF COURSE MANAGEMENT -
